COURSE DESCRIPTION

General Psychology is a survey of the major psychological topics, theories, and approaches to the scientific study of behavior and mental processes.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to

1. Identify various research methods and their characteristics used in the scientific study of psychology.
2. Describe the historical influences and early schools of thought that shaped the field of psychology.
3. Describe some of the prominent perspectives and approaches used in the study of psychology.
4. Use terminology unique to the study of psychology.
5. Describe accepted approaches and standards in psychological assessment and evaluation.
6. Identify factors in physiological and psychological processes involved in human behavior.

RESPONSE TIMES

The instructor will respond to email and voice mail communication within 24 hours or 48 hours on a weekend. Assignment grades will be published within 1 week of the assignment due date. WEEKLY HAWKES LEARNING ASSIGNMENTS:

40% of your total grade

For each week there is an online Hawkes Learning assignment that will require you to stepwise go through three stages: learning, practice, then certify. This program is adaptive, and you can be persistent until you obtain 100% correct responses. Although there are 14 assignments, the grades are averaged with one final percentage synchronized from Hawkes Learning to Blackboard. The learning assignments have a 10% penalty per day of being late by being past the deadline.

CHAPTER TESTS:

30% of your total course grade

All tests are 25 questions with a 30-minute time limit. The tests cover only the material learned in the Hawkes Learning material for the respective weekly section and are not comprehensive in nature, although some material may overlap sections. Tests become available at a certain date and end at a certain date each week that corresponds to the material scheduled to

be covered. You cannot jump ahead and finish the course in a short amount of time outside of the weekly timed format. There is a 20% penalty applied to tests completed past the deadline. Deadlines are Mondays at 11:59 PM.

CHAPTER CRITICAL THINKING ANALYSIS DISCUSSIONS:

10% total course grade

In week 1, students will post their first discussion board that gives some introduction of themselves, what psychology means to them, and what they expect to get out of the course.

Week 1 will give the student an opportunity to get accustomed to navigating in blackboard. You will be required to post to all of your classmates' posts in the first week, but only in the first week. It is encouraged that students take this opportunity to greet one another while maintaining a professional and collegial narrative. Also, in week 1 there will be a posting to the discussion board that will be your first critical thinking analysis on Chapter 1.

After completing all readings for each week's module post your initial critical thinking discussion to the discussion board where students are expected to submit one, (after week 9 a 500 word minimum) critical thinking analysis (the form is defined in the Resource section) that discusses all readings for the module, in one analysis for the chapter or chapters. Students will be expected to participate in the weekly threaded Discussion Board topics. The deadline for posting your discussion is each **Friday at 11:59 pm**. An important part of your weekly assignments will be to read and give feedback on 2 other students' papers, in addition to posting your own. Give feedback to different students each week. This will ensure that all students are getting feedback each week. Your feedback should fundamentally be focused on essential INTELLECTUAL STANDARDS (found in the Miniature Guide to Scientific Thinking) and should be constructive and respectful in nature. (Note that you are required to give feedback on two papers total per week, but feel free to give as much feedback as you have time for on other students' papers). A grading rubric is provided in the Resources\Critical Thinking Resources content on Blackboard.

CORE ASSESSMENT PROJECT:

10% of total course grade

Students are required to submit a short project paper that will assess:

- A. Critical Thinking: To include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- B. Communication: To include the effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- C. Empirical and Quantitative Skills: To include the manipulation of analysis of numerical data and observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.
- D. Social Responsibility: To include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.

COMPREHENSIVE FINAL TEST

10% of your total course grade

There will be a 100-question timed multiple choice test given as a final in this course. There will be a time limit of 100 minutes which averages one minute per question. The material tested will

be all material that was covered during the semester. The final is required and is not optional. It is recommended that periodic review of the material occurs throughout the semester to ensure retention of all material.

EXTRA CREDIT:

There will be no extra credit offered in this course. Students should not request extra credit or other types of special treatment as doing so could result in a five-point deduction in the overall course grade. Time spent on an extra-credit assignment should have been spent on the material during the semester. Extra credit assignments are tantamount to failing a driving test and then requesting writing a driving essay in lieu.

MAKE-UP WORK

There are late penalties of 10% per day past the deadline for the Hawkes mastery assignments. There are some makeup opportunities for tests once past the deadline that carry a 20% late penalty. No assignments are accepted via email, only the assignment submission box in Blackboard. All assignments will have 2 and only 2 submissions in the event of an upload failure or some other event that prevents a successful first submission.

Deadlines must be adhered to to successfully complete this course on time. Outside activities such as vacations, weddings, etc. are not excused due to the restricted time frame.

Get your work done early. I will not accept late work for any reason other than what is listed above. Unfortunately, some will test this policy and wait until one minute has passed from the deadline and then attempt to give me a myriad of excuses. I will not accept late work or more importantly, treat students differently. Early work is encouraged! Some of you will wait until late in the day something is due to complete items. That is fine but there is no instructor support. I consider this waiting until the last moment. Items are typically available the weekend before they are due for those of you that can only get work done on the weekend. I urge you not to wait.

It's important to mention that despite the policy of not allowing make-ups, our grading system is designed with some flexibility to accommodate unforeseen challenges. As a form of safety net, the course policy states that the lowest grade you receive on an assignment, essay, or test will be dropped when calculating your final grade. This system aims to support students who may have struggled with a particular assignment or faced unexpected obstacles during the semester.

INCOMPLETE

Students opting to receive an Incomplete grade are still expected to have participated in class activities, assessments, and assignments throughout the semester with something unavoidable occurring that would physically prevent completion of the class past the final drop date
