Jumpstart Reading and Writing (INRW 0100)

Credit: 1 semester credit hour (1 hour lecture)

Prerequisites/Co-requisites:

- 1. TSI Reading score of 345-350, and
- 2. TSI Writing score of 339 or below, and
- 3. An ABE of 4 or higher, and
- 4. 4 or lower on the essay, and
- 5. Co-enrollment in English 1301.

Course Description

Integration of critical reading and academic writing skills. This course fulfills TSI requirements for reading and/or writing. This class is located in a computer lab so students can work on ENGL 1301 coursework. An instructor will be available to tutor students who need help.

- 6. Determine and use effective approaches and rhetorical strategies for given reading and writing situations.
- 7. Generate ideas and gather information relevant to the topic and purpose, incorporating the ideas and words of other writers in student writing using established strategies.
- 8. Evaluate relevance and quality of ideas and information in recognizing, formulating, and developing a claim.
- 9. Develop and use effective reading and revision strategies to strengthen the writer's ability to compose college-level writing assignments.
- 10. Recognize and apply the conventions of Standard English in reading and writing.
