COURSE DESCRIPTION

A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era to the Civil War/Reconstruction period. United States History I includes the study of pre-Columbian, colonial, revolutionary, early national, slavery and sectionalism, and the Civil War/Reconstruction eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History I include: American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, and creation of the federal government.

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to

- 1. Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.
- 2. Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
- 3. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.

- 1. Critical Thinking Skills: To include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- 2. Personal Responsibility: To include the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Students must attend class every scheduled class day. The instructor counts attendance using Starfish every scheduled class day. STARFISH

ADDITIONAL COURSE POLICIES/INFORMATION

- 1. **QUIZZES**: Students will take quizzes in class, unless otherwise noted. There are **two** types of quizzes: **primary source reading quizzes** and **lecture review quizzes**.
 - a. **Primary source reading quizzes**: These quizzes are worth 10 points each, unless otherwise noted. These quizzes are based on the information the student reads from the **primary source readings**, as scheduled.
 - b. Lecture review quizzes: These quizzes are worth 10 points each, unless otherwise noted. These quizzes are to test the student's knowledge over lecture material and serve as a review for the class.

- c. Students that miss in-class assignments (like quizzes) cannot make up the assignment unless the student is out because of a **documented sickness or a documented school-related absence**. The student must receive permission from the instructor to makeup a missed assignment.
- d. Any student caught **cheating** on a quiz will receive a **zero** for that quiz. Cheating on a quiz includes looking at classmates' quizzes or using one's phone during the quiz. Other pop quizzes and in-class assignments can be given **randomly**. Pop quizzes and in-class assignments will be worth 10 points each, unless otherwise noted.
- 2. **EXAMS**: study material for the exams will come primarily from the **in-class/recorded lectures**, as well as the material that students read in the **primary source documents**. Exams are worth **100 points total**.
 - a. Students that miss a test are only allowed to make up the exam if the student has an **unavoidable emergency**. The student must **contact** the instructor as soon as possible to schedule a make-up exam.
 - b. Any student caught **cheating** on an exam will receive a **zero** on that exam. Cheating on an exam includes using sources like Wikipedia to answer questions. DO NOT USE WIKIPEDIA TO STUDY FOR THE EXAM.
- 3. **ROUGH DRAFT ASSIGNMENT & BOOK ASSIGNMENT**: Students will turn in their rough draft and their final submission for the book assignment to **Blackboard** on the **due date scheduled** (or earlier). Students are required to check the "SafeAssign" box so that their assignment is checked for **plagiarism** through the online software.
 - a. There are **two books** listed for the class. The student gets to **pick one** book out of the two that they want to read for the assignment. There are **two assignments**: a rough draft assignment and then the final submission of the assignment.
 - b. Students can submit their book assignment late; however, there is a 10-point deduction for each 24-hour day that the assignment in turned in late (this includes weekends). The instructor will not accept the book assignment after 4 days past the due date. Students will receive a zero for the book assignment if they do not turn in their book assignment.
 - c. Plagiarism will not be tolerated. All assignments are checked for plagiarism, which includes: not properly citing quotes from the book, slightly changing the words of sentences that are not the intellectual property of the student, copying a previous student's book assignment, or improperly using sources from the internet. The student should not use <u>ANY</u> internet sources to help them with this assignment (unless the student needs information on the author). If the student plagiarizes on the book assignment, the student will receive a <u>zero</u> for the assignment. The online software will show some plagiarism on the book assignment, especially if you use quotes from the book. Just make sure you are properly citing the quote with page numbers and quotation marks.
 - d. The student **must complete the book assignment to pass the course**. If a student completes all other work, yet does not turn in the book assignment, the student will receive an "F" in the course.

- 4. <u>COVID-19 CASES</u>: If you are sick with a persistent cough, sniffles, cold, high temperature (100.4 or higher), flu symptoms, etc., then please do not attend class. If you feel that you might have COVID-19, or you have been exposed to someone with a positive COVID-19 result, please get tested and do not come to class until you have tested negative for COVID-19 or you have quarantined for at least 5 days after a positive result. It is the policy of LIT that you do not attend class until after 5 days of quarantine if you have received a positive result of COVID-19 (please provide documentation by email).
