COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an exploration of the purposes and processes in the visual and performing arts (such as music, painting, architecture, drama, and dance) and the ways in which they express the values of cultures and human experience.

1. Employ formal elements and principles to critically analyze various works of the visual and performing arts.
2. Articulate the creative process of artistic works and expressions of human experience and cultural values.
3. Demonstrate an understanding of the aesthetic principles that guide the creation of, and response to, the arts.
4. Describe the relationship of the arts to everyday life.

Communication

Grading

Assignments will be graded within five business days after submission. Example; an assignment submitted on a Monday will be graded by the following Monday. Assignments recognized as a breach of the academic honesty or this policy will result in a grade of 0 unless other institution policies supersede this decision. Late Work

Students may submit late work up to three days after grades for the homework are posted to blackboard. This will result in a 10% grade deduction. Example; if homework grades were posted Monday at 12:00 pm then the last day it can be submitted is Thursday at 12:00 pm for a 10% grade reduction. Work submitted after this period will be entered as a 0.

Late work will be accepted at the discretion of the instructor. Generally, it is best to give notice well in advance for any work which needs late submission.

No assignments (with the exception of the final project) can be submitted after the last day of classes (12/06/24).

Resubmission

Students may resubmit assignments at the instructor's discretion. However, students will have up to three days after grades are posted to alert the instructor that they would like to resubmit an assignment. Resubmitted assignments can achieve a maximum score of 80%.
