Application of communication theory to interpersonal relationship development, maintenance, and termination in relationship contexts including friendships, romantic partners, families, and relationships with co-workers and supervisors.

- Identify types of and barriers to effective listening.
- Demonstrate written and oral competencies as it relates to employment (including job searches, interviews, interpersonal interaction, conflict management, and leadership and performance appraisals).

ADDITIONAL COURSE POLICIES/INFORMATION

- Respectful participation in class discussions is expected. At times, students may have differing viewpoints from those of their classmates. Disagreements lead to critical thinking, scholarly debates, and learning, however, disrespect for the opinions of others will not be tolerated.
- Sleeping is not allowed in class. If a student is caught sleeping in class, there will be a warning (to be discussed in class), after that there will a consequence which may include an essay test.
- Food will be allowed in class if it does not interrupt class instruction. Please clean up after yourself. ***Do not leave my class to pick up Door Dash.
- Habitual tardiness exhibits a lack of consideration for others because it is disruptive, therefore students will receive one absence after three tardies, and this process will be repeated for every three late appearances to class. Being tardy on day of an exam may result in a student not being allowed to take the exam.
- You are expected to take care of restroom needs before class. If you must go in the middle of class, just go, however, regularly getting up to leave in the middle of class will result in you being counted absent.
- Cellphone usage during class instruction or class work will not be tolerated. If cellphone usage is observed, there will be a warning. After that, there will be a consequence which may include an essay test.
- It is my policy that I do not accept late work. That being said, I know that there are sometimes unforeseen circumstances that arise where exceptions should be made. - Assignments will be graded within one week of submission.
- Do not drop the course without talking to me first. I may offer extra credit opportunities throughout the semester. I also may be able to offer additional resources to help with areas of concern. Students have dropped in the past when there is a good chance that they would not fail.

- I prefer emails from your LIT Account. There is sometimes a delay with using Blackboard Messenger.
- I check all written assignments for AI generated content. I reserve the right to fail an assignment if I find it has been either plagiarized or AI generated. This is especially true on

discussion posts. I am more interested that you understand the material. You can express this using your own words through discussion posts.

• Student assignments are accepted solely on Blackboard. Work will not be accepted via email or in person. It is the student's responsibility to learn to use Blackboard appropriately. Blackboard training is offered to students at no cost.

• No late work is accepted under any circumstances.

• Speech requirements are listed below. Failure to comply with all requirements on a speech assignment will result in a zero grade for that speech.

Students must submit:

- Full-sentence/preparation outline (not required for logo speech)
- Works Cited page (not required for logo speech)
- Visual aid (Prezi, Canva, Keynote)
- Speech video

Student speech videos must clearly show the front of the student throughout the entire speech. Failure to do so will result in a zero.

• The audience must be a minimum of 5 adults (18 years or older). Failure to have at least 3 adult audience members will result in a zero.

• Videos must be unedited. Edited videos will result in a zero.

Videos must be correctly uploaded to YouTube with an "unlisted" or "public" privacy setting. If you set it to "private," I will not be able to view it and therefore it is as if you didn't turn it in.
Videos must be focused (not blurry, fuzzy, etc.) and must not have background noise such as babies, children, pets, TVs, cell phones, etc.

• Students are expected to dress appropriately for speeches. Sometimes in the online course people get "too comfortable" when speaking in their own homes. Wearing of ball caps, inappropriate clothing or chewing gum, not wearing shoes, etc. during a speech will result in a letter grade penalty. Remember this course is college course and you are giving professional/formal presentations. Think about the impression your dress might make on your audience.

• You are expected to WATCH your videos. Watch them before you post to YouTube. Ask yourself "Is this my best work?" If not, you may have to record again. Do not let the first 'take' be the only time you do your speech. You should practice many times before you ever bring in the audience and the camera.

• Speeches that are read will be penalized up to 2 letter grades per speech. The goal of this class is to speak extemporaneously; well-researched, well-rehearsed, effective use of notecards, and overall well-prepared speeches are the expectation. Reading is not effective or acceptable.

• Speeches will receive a penalty if they are not in the assigned time limit. The penalty is 1 point per 5-second increment, over or under time.

Participation grade

Participation is worth 100 points. It's based on the activities we complete in class. To receive points, you must actively take part in the discussions, games, quizzes, and written assignments. If you are absent these points cannot be made up.

• Journal guidelines

Journal entry assignments are designed to show that you understand the relationship between chapter content and real-world communication situations. Entries should be 300 to 500 words in length. When writing entries, you may be as personal as you choose. Never feel that you have to share more than you are comfortable sharing. Journal entries are due on the dates posted on the calendar. Late journals are not accepted. Each entry is graded on content, relationship to the concept in the journal prompt, development and completion of thoughts in writing, proper use of grammar/capitalization/spelling, and the guidelines above.

• Syllabus agreement

Upon completion of reading the Syllabus, you're required to complete the syllabus quiz online by August 30, 2024, you'll earn 10 points.
