#### Reasons to not Use Al

- ~It is cheating.
- ~AI will give the same or very similar answer to a question which makes it easier to catch.
- ~ You are missing out on valuable learning opportunities.
- "It makes my instructor read the same material over and over again. This will eventually make her go crazy.
- It is your responsibility to check and make sure that your assignment was submitted correctly. If you notice that your submission was submitted incorrectly then you have 15 minutes from the deadline to email me the submission. After that, it will not be graded.
- Unless an assignment says that it is a group project, collaborating with your classmates is not allowed.
- If you think that something has been graded unfairly you can ask me to review it but please be aware that your grade can go down as well as up after the review.
- I allow students to eat in class but please make sure that you clean up your mess. Please do not order a door dash to my class. I reserve the right to eat whatever is delivered or raffle it off to the highest bidder. (I am joking. Just don't do it.)
