- Use of AI is at the instructor's discretion.
- All submitted work must be your own unless otherwise specified.
- In this course, AI may be used **only if credited**. If you use AI (e.g., ChatGPT) to draft or brainstorm, you must:
  - 1. Revise the draft into your own words.
  - 2. Include a note in your submission stating which AI platform was used.
- Journals and personal reflections must be student-written, not Al-generated.

### **Instructor Contact**

- Email is the best way to reach me (response time: 24–48 business hours).
- Always include your course and section number in the subject line.
- **Do not email assignments**. All work must be submitted through Blackboard.
- If you resubmit corrected work, email me which assignment you resubmitted.

## **Technology & Document Creation**

- Reliable computer and internet access are required (phones/tablets often cause formatting issues).
- Microsoft Office 365 is free to all students through MyLIT email.
- Do not use Google Docs or cloud links; upload the actual file.
- Verify formatting after upload.
- Acceptable formats:
  - Writing: .doc or .docx only (MLA template provided in Orientation folder).
  - o Images: .jpg, .png, .gif, .tif, .pdf (no .heic files).

• MLA Style is required for all written work (except discussions/journals). Non-MLA or single-spaced work = maximum 50%.

### **Discussion Boards**

- Each assignment requires **one original post** (meeting word count) plus **at least two substantive peer replies**.
- Replies must be thoughtful (not just "I agree"). Minimum 10 words.
- Posts without peer replies = 50% grade.
- If posting early, return before the deadline to add replies.

# **Grading Breakdown**

- Original post: 50%
- Each peer reply (10+ words): 10% each
- Example: 1 post + 2 replies = 70/100

#### **Journals**

- Informal reflections, minimum 100 words (typed directly into Blackboard).
- Do not attach documents or submit links.
- Grading Scale:
  - 0.00 100 words = 70
  - o 200+ words = 100 (full scale available in Blackboard).
- Depth of thought matters as much as length.

## **Assignments & Submissions**

- All assignments must be uploaded to the correct Blackboard link.
- Do not email assignments under any circumstances.
- Assignments are open for the length of the entire semester.
- Submit early to allow time for technical issues.
- Regarding Dual Credit- assignments are submitted and due dates are determined based on the LIT academic calendar, not your school calendar. So, be aware that you might still

- have submissions due for this course even though you are in an "Off" period for your campus.
- If you are going to be away or unavailable from the course for any reason (work, vacation, etc. You are still responsible for submitting assignments by the due dates. You can always submit early!

#### **Late Work & Resubmissions**

- Penalty: -10 points per calendar day late.
- Timeline: Late work or resubmissions will not be graded right away. They will be graded within two weeks after the next unit closes.
- No submissions accepted after the final course regular session due date (finals week dates do not count).
- Do not resubmit graded work unless I give permission. If you do resubmit, email me the assignment title immediately (no email = no grade update).
- Only documented Blackboard outages excuse late submissions.

### **Completion & Due Dates**

# **Art Projects**

- Unless otherwise specified, all art must be created by hand with traditional media (pencil, paint, etc.).
- Each project must include:
  - o At least **four progress pictures** (do not include picture of your materials).
  - o A journal entry, if part of the assignment.
  - o Possible discussion board critiques or artist statement.
- Any work must be **new**, created for the assignment.
- Do not submit lined paper drawings (automatic zero).
- Projects are graded on effort, understanding of **art elements & principles**, and ability to explain your work—not on artistic mastery.

• Flat, minimal-effort drawings will fail.

## Writing & Assessment

- All formal writing (essays, responses, critiques, etc.):
  - o Minimum of 3 paragraphs unless otherwise specified.
  - MLA Style required (template provided).
  - Academic voice; no second person ("you/your").
  - o No outside sources unless assignment requires it.
- One-paragraph submissions = automatic 50%.
- Assignments generally graded within two weeks of unit close.
- Editing help available free via Tutor.com (Books & Tools panel in Blackboard).

### **Quizzes, Tests, and Readings**

- Complete quizzes, tests, and readings by their unit deadlines.
- Once a unit closes, those items are no longer available.
- No individual extra credit. If any extra credit is offered, it will be announced to the entire class.

### **Academic Integrity**

- Plagiarism and cheating will not be tolerated.
- All papers checked with SafeAssign. Review reports and revise before submission.
- Plagiarized work = 0 on the assignment and possible failure in the course.

## **Final Project**

- The final project is required to pass this course.
- It is research-based and may include multiple components. Follow instructions carefully.

## **Incomplete Policy**

In addition to LIT's policy, you must meet these conditions to qualify for an incomplete:

### **Additional Face-to-Face Classroom Policies**

(these issues usually do not come up, but here is how they are handled if they do)

You are considered absent if you enter the classroom after the official class start time. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that work hours or other responsibilities do not conflict with school attendance. And please, do not tell me you're going to miss school because of vacation. Vacation is NOT an excused absence.

If you are going to miss class because of a school sanctioned athletic event or will be out on an extended absence for a medical issue, please provide me with documentation from your school or medical professional so I can excuse absences if needed.

Daily Assignments: Daily assignments are a part of the daily grades percentage of the overall course grade. Daily grades can be worth a significant portion of your overall class grade. Daily assignments will be given sporadically and without notice and will cover any materials from any assigned reading, as well as any topics covered in class through discussion or lecture. Daily assignments will be completed during the class period in which they are assigned, except for website assignments, which must be completed within the assignment time allowance given. If you are absent on the day of a daily assignment you cannot make them up. Do not ask!!

Class Participation: I expect students to arrive alert and prepared for class. Students who contribute meaningful comments and questions will be given every consideration in making borderline final grade decisions. Always bring your books, paper, and a writing implement (pen, pencil, etc.), and always be prepared for a quiz. It is always a good idea to take notes.

Early Exits: This class is a longer class. I promise I will provide plenty of breaks as needed. Please try to make every effort to be present while you are here. Students who leave class without notifying me prior to class will lose any daily assignment points for that day and will be marked absent. Please use the restroom prior to class. If you are dealing with some sort of urgent situation that requires your attention, please let me know. Maybe there's a way I can help.

Electronics and Cell Phones: DO NOT USE YOUR CELL PHONE OR ANY OTHER ELECTRONIC DEVICE DURING CLASS FOR ANY REASON, without specific permission. Cell phones and other devices should be turned off before the start of class. Do not spend too much time "Below the Horizon" and do not let me see the "glow." Students who do not heed this rule will be asked to leave class and will be

considered absent for that day. No computers or any other electronic devices are allowed without the instructor's permission and a disability accommodation letter.

Remove earphones during class.

Disruptive Behavior: Any student engaging in disruptive behavior will be asked to leave class and will be counted absent for that day. Disruptive behavior includes, but is not limited to, the following list: arguing with the instructor about individual issues during class time, interrupting class lecture for personal reasons, doing work for another class, reading outside materials, sending or reading text messages, and engaging in private conversations. Continued disruptions are grounds for permanent removal from class. See attendance policy above.

Sleeping in Class: Any student caught sleeping in class will be counted absent for that day.

Supplies: Always bring your book, paper, and a writing implement to class. Any student without these supplies will be marked absent for that day.

Email: If you have any questions always feel free to contact me via email or come by my office. I am always eager and more than willing to help students.

Eating and Drinking: I have no problem with drinks in class, but no eating is allowed.

No visitors, children, or pets allowed in class. DO NOT allow anyone to interrupt our class or the group environment under any circumstances.

#### **Final Notes**

- Be respectful in discussions and critiques. Controversy is fine; hate speech and derogatory content are not.
- All course materials, policies, and dates may be revised to address unforeseen circumstances.
