## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the Civil War/Reconstruction era to the present. United States History II examines industrialization, immigration, world wars, the Great Depression, Cold War, and post-Cold War eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, urbanization and suburbanization, the expansion of the federal government, and the study of U.S. foreign policy.

- 1. Create an argument using historical evidence.
- 2. Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
- 3. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.

## ATTENDANCE POLICY

## ADDITIONAL COURSE POLICIES/INFORMATION

<u>1. QUIZZES</u>: Students will take quizzes online. There are two types of quizzes: primary source reading quizzes and lecture review quizzes.

a. <u>Primary source reading quizzes</u>: These quizzes are worth **10 points each**, unless otherwise noted. These quizzes are based on the information the student reads from the **primary source readings**, as scheduled.

b. <u>Lecture review quizzes</u>: These quizzes are worth 10 points each, unless otherwise noted. These quizzes are to test the student's **knowledge over lecture material** and serve as a review for the class.

c. Students that miss assignments (like quizzes) cannot make up the assignment unless the student had a documented sickness or a documented school-related absence. The student must receive **permission** from the instructor to makeup a missed assignment.

d. Any student **caught cheating on a quiz will receive a zero for that quiz**. For online classes, cheating includes **using information found online**, like Wikipedia or other similar sites. <u>DO NOT</u> <u>USE WIKIPEDIA TO STUDY FOR THE QUIZZES</u>. All information should be found in the <u>lectures</u>. Do NOT <u>Copy and Paste</u> responses from websites. Do NOT use <u>Artificial Intelligence (AI)</u>.

2. <u>EXAMS</u>: study material for the exams will come primarily from the lectures, as well as the material that students read in the primary source documents. Exams are worth 100 points total.

a. Students that miss a test are only allowed to make up the exam if the student has an **unavoidable emergency**. The student **must contact the instructor** as soon as possible to schedule a make-up exam.

b. Any student **caught cheating on an exam will receive a zero on that exam**. Cheating on an exam includes using sources like Wikipedia to answer questions. <u>DO NOT USE WIKIPEDIA TO</u> <u>STUDY FOR THE EXAM.</u> Do NOT <u>Copy and Paste</u> responses from websites. Do NOT use <u>Artificial Intelligence (AI)</u>.

**3. JOURNAL ENTRIES:** Journal Entries, as scheduled, shall consist of a student's **own** reflection and analysis of that week's lecture and information given regarding the historical topic covered. Students are expected to write at least **100 words** per entry and include specific information, evidence from the lecture given. Long quotations and/or block quotations are **NOT** allowed. Failure to comply with these requirements will result in a low grade or **zero** for the assignment. This includes the use of outside online information, and the use of AI.

**4.DISCUSSION POSTS**: Discussion post, as scheduled, should be in response to the instructor's prompt for that week's lecture. Students shall use their **own** analysis, reflection to respond to these prompts. Additionally, students also need to include specific information/evidence from the covered lecture. Entries should be at least **100 words**. As part of the full discussion post grade, students should also respond to at least **2 other classmates** in a courteous manner, with a response of at least **50 words** to each classmate. Long quotations and/or block quotations are **NOT** allowed. Failure to comply with these requirements will result in a low grade or **zero** for the assignment. This includes the use of outside online information, and the use of AI.

**5. ROUGH DRAFT ASSIGNMENT & FINAL ASSIGNMENT**: Students will turn in their Prewriting assignment and their final submission for the final assignment to **Blackboard** on the **due date scheduled** (or earlier). Students are required to check the "**SafeAssign**" box so that their assignment is checked for plagiarism through the online software.

There is a list of approved films in the "Cultural Artifact" assignment folder for the class. The student gets to pick <u>ONE</u> film out of the suggested film list. The student is **responsible** for researching their movie option prior to selection. **Ex. Rating, Content, Etc.** If a student has a film, they would like to pick that is not on the approved list, it must be first approved by the instructor.

There are two portions to this assignment: **Rough Draft Assignment** and **Final Submission of the Assignment**. The Rough Draft assignment is not a typical rough draft of your final paper. It is a questionand-answer assignment, the form can be found on Blackboard.

Final Submission Options: Students will choose a historical movie and opt for ONE of the following formats:

- Video Presentation: A visual analysis comprising movie clips/images, personal analysis, evidence, lasting over 10 minutes.
- Written Analysis: A comprehensive 3-page essay interpreting the historical accuracy and directorial choices.

# Students shall choose the option they are the most comfortable with. Please check the assignment folder on Blackboard for requirements and additional information.

b. The instructor will <u>NOT</u> accept late submissions. For extensions, instructor should be contacted immediately. Students will receive a <u>zero</u> for the assignment if they do not turn in their assignments. Students should keep in mind that the Rough Draft and Final Assignment are core assignments, which means they are **mandatory**.

c. Plagiarism will <u>NOT</u> be tolerated. All assignments are checked for plagiarism, which includes not properly citing quote, slightly changing the words of sentences that are not the intellectual property of the student, copying someone's previous work or improperly using sources from the internet. The student should **not** use **ANY** internet sources to help them with this assignment (unless the student needs specific information about the movie). This includes the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI). If the student plagiarizes on the Final assignment, the student will receive a **ZERO** for the assignment. The online software will show some plagiarism on the assignment, especially if the student uses quotes from the movie. The student needs to make sure they are properly citing the quote with the appropriate information and quotation marks. Students should limit the use of citations. **NO** block quotations will be allowed, each citation should typically be of 20 words or less.

d. The student must complete the final assignment to pass the course. If a student completes all other work, yet does not turn in the book assignment, the student will receive an "F" in the course.
