Electronic Attendance Policy

Many of my classes and students are completely online, or Dual Credit/Dual Enrollment Students. As such, it is important that you show activity in Blackboard so that I know you are staying up to date on the course. You need to get into the habit of logging into blackboard no less than 3 times a week on different days. Any student who goes more than 5 days without some kind of Blackboard activity should expect an email from me (so that I know you are still working through the content and not getting behind.) You do have the freedom to work ahead. So time management in this course to essential. If you know you are going to be away for an extended period of time, it would be to your benefit to complete assignments/quizzes/exams ahead of time.

Late Policy

There have to be stiff penalties for turning in late work. But I am also aware that many of my Dual Enrollment students likely have a full schedule of extracurriculars. This is why I allow early turn ins. If you are going to be late with something, it is important you contact your instructor BEFOREHAND (and not after the due date.) We are here to work with you as much as we can. Late work will have 5 points taken off the total possible grade for every 24-hour period until it is turned in (this includes holidays and weekends.) The moment something is not turned in, do not be surprised to see a zero in the grade book. Work turned in late will show a zero until your instructor has a chance to grade it.

Extra Credit:

I do not give 'bumps' at the end of the semester. This means if you have an 89.999999% you have a B. But I do give the class ample extra credit. I will never give the opportunity for extra credit to one student and not others. Extra credit will be talked about in class early in the semester. You have all semester to decide to do it or not. It is completely optional.

A note to Dual Enrollment Students

Attendance will be taken per the district policy at your high school. It is essential that you stay active in Blackboard and make sure you show routine online activity in Blackboard.
