COURSE DESCRIPTION

- 5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in the political system.
- 6. Analyze the election process.
- 7. Describe the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
- 8. Analyze issues and policies in U.S. politics.
