**COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

**Integration of critical reading and academic writing skills.** Successful completion of this intervention if taught at the upper (exit) level fulfills TSI requirements for reading and writing.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Locate explicit textual information, draw complex inferences, and describe, analyze, and evaluate the information within and across multiple texts of varying lengths.
2. Comprehend and use vocabulary effectively in oral communication, reading, and writing.
3. Identify and analyze the audience, purpose, and message across a variety of texts.
4. Describe and apply insights gained from reading and writing a variety of texts.
5. Compose a variety of texts that demonstrate reading comprehension, clear focus, logical development of ideas, and use of appropriate language that advance the writer's purpose.
6. Determine and use effective approaches and rhetorical strategies for given reading and writing situations.
7. Generate ideas and gather information relevant to the topic and purpose, incorporating the ideas and words of other writers in student writing using established strategies.
8. Evaluate relevance and quality of ideas and information in recognizing, formulating, and developing a claim.
9. Develop and use effective reading and revision strategies to strengthen the writer's ability to compose collegelevel writing assignments.
10. Recognize and apply the conventions of Standard English in reading and writing.

#### Core Objectives

1. Critical Thinking Skills: To include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
2. Communication Skills: To include effective development, interpretation, and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
3. Teamwork: To include the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others.
4. Personal Responsibility: To include the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making.

## **REQUIRED TEXTBOOK AND MATERIALS**

All required reading materials are provided by instructor in Blackboard.
