#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis. Note: ENGL 1301 is a prerequisite for all 2000-level literature courses.

# **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of individual and collaborative writing processes.
- 2. Develop ideas with appropriate support and attribution.
- 3. Write in a style appropriate to audience and purpose.
- 4. Read, reflect, and respond critically to a variety of texts.
- 5. Use Edited American English in academic essays.

# **Core Objectives**

- 1. Critical Thinking Skills: To include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation, and synthesis of information.
- 2. Communication Skills: To include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.

3. Personal Responsibility: To include the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making.

# REQUIRED TEXTBOOK AND MATERIALS

An electronic device with access to the Internet. There is no required textbook for this class.

#### ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

Students are not allowed to use advanced automated tools (artificial intelligence or machine learning tools such as ChatGPT or Dall-E 2) on assignments in this course. I expect that all work students submit for this course will be their own. Each student is expected to complete each assignment without substantive assistance from others. This assistance includes digitalized machinery tools that can mimic creation of student work. The editorial feature in the Microsoft Word app does not fall into the advanced automated tools, as it is a feature to suggest edits for spelling and grammar. Likewise, Grammarly and Hemingway do not fall into this category, as it does not generate or mimic creation of student work. Violation of this policy will result in an automatic zero for the grade on the assignment, with no opportunity to rewrite and resubmit the assignment. Continuation of generated AI content will result in disciplinary action.
