#### Determination drives Cameron Love

The gaps between Hurricanes Ike and Rita didn't leave much time for people in effected areas to recover. Devastation and destruction reached more than the Love family's home in LaBelle, Texas. As they tried to rebuild, Cameron Love's parents nearly depleted their children's college fund by 2010.

"I felt college was a lost dream because of the trials (I) experienced (at that time) in life. But I persevered and prayed," Love said.

Love used the remains of his college fund to purchase a car so he could work at a local deli and save for college.

In 2013 he felt college was finally a possibility and took a step that would change his life forever.

"LIT was the first place I turned to, knowing they offered a degree that suited my abilities and dreams," Love said.

Love's passion was design and drafting. He enrolled in Computer-Aided Drafting (CAD). After graduating from LIT in 2015, he became a full-time draftsman, and soon after he was named head of the company's drafting department.

"LIT taught me always to push myself to the limit and continue to learn more each day. And for that I am thankful," Love said. "Overall, LIT has changed my life drastically, and it has given me a chance to excel in my career as a student and a professional."

#### American Dream is possible at LIT

A New York Times study shows poor students have a better chance to become rich adults at LIT.

LIT placed 21st out of 690 twoyear colleges in overall mobility, representing the likelihood that a LIT graduate can move up two or more income groups, an astonishing 30 percent. This is, according to a study from "Mobility Report Cards: The Role



of Colleges in Intergenerational **Process Operating students Aaron Nichols and Alicia Ramsey** Mobility," the Equality of Opportunity Project\*.

We also ranked among the highest in 2 year public and private not-for-profit colleges in median individual income at age 34—for men: \$49,200, and total: \$34,400. The school also ranked in the top for average income percentile, and the share who end up in the top 5 percent, 10 percent and 20 percent. A poor student has a 19 percent chance to become a rich adult after graduating from the college.

LIT President Dr. Lonnie L. Howard said, "This New York Times article is enlightening and proof-positive of our long-term commitment to our school:

#### **Demolition marks** new era in Student Success at LIT

All that remains of the demolished T1 Building at Lamar Institute of Technology is rubble and an unscathed copper plaque that holds the history of 59 years and thousands of students.

In its place a new \$6.1 million Student Success Building will Demolition of the T1 building begins. be erected. Demolition of the building, located behind Cecil Beeson, began in late June with an estimated completion date set for June 2019.

Building T1 was one of the campus oldest facilities, built in 1959 as part of Lamar University. Before the construction of the PATC Building, T1 was also home to Process Operating and Instrumentation classrooms and faculty offices. Ownership





was transferred to LIT in 2001, The original dedication plaque from the 1959 building dedication. according to Allison Martin,

LIT Property Accountant. The construction of the Student Success Building will complement renovations on building T-4, which commenced on July 2.

"The total project cost including demolition is \$7,417,590," LIT Vice President for Finance & Operations Bonnie Albright said.

The building will house Financial Aid, Student Government Association, Advising/ Outreach, Student Activities, Career Services, Admissions, The Testing Center, Teaching and Learning Center with Online Learning and Adjunct suite. These departments have been located in Buildings T1, T4 and T5. Also included are a multipurpose room, computer lab and indoor and outdoor gathering spaces for students.

The current plaque outside T1 will be "retired," Albright said. It contains a list of the 1959 Board of Regents, architect, college president and chancellor. A new plaque will be installed in the building with updated information.
