Spring Enrollment is Up 7.7%

LIT's certified Spring 2018 credit enrollment was up 7.7% when compared to Spring 2017. Even more impressive, Dual Credit (DC) and Early College High School (ECHS) enrollment is up 170%. Included in this overall enrollment increase for Spring 2018, there are 335 ECHS and DC students mainly from Beaumont and Silsbee ISD.

Legislative Testimony

On April 25, I presented written and oral testimony before the Texas Senate Higher Education Committee charged with reviewing the 60x30TX Statewide Plan. My testimony addressed our innovative relationship with Beaumont ISD through our Early College High School (ECHS) and Industry Cluster Innovative



Academy (ICIA). Specifically, how these are helping achieve 60x30TX by awarding certifications in relevant fields of industry. Additionally, my testimony highlighted progress in achieving our goals within the 60x30TX plan, and efforts to implement innovative and non-traditional models of education delivery to meet the needs of an increasingly diverse student body.

THECB Accountability/ 60x30TX Meeting

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board recognized our college on April 3 as a top performer in three areas of 60x30TX: Overall Completions (+42.81%), Economically-Disad-



vantaged Completions (+36.73%), and Graduates per full-time-equivalent student (+10.96) based on our 2017 accountability data. As a member of The Texas State University System, our college has greatly benefited from the leadership of our Chancellor, Dr. Brian McCall. In August 2016, Chancellor McCall initiated Vision 2020 goals to align institutional outcomes with the Coordinating Board's 60x30TX Plan. LIT's Shared Vision operationalizes both Vision 2020 and the 60x30TX Plan to the point where it is moving our institution to the top of Texas 2 year colleges!

Development (Major Donation)

ExxonMobil donated a fire truck to LIT to support training at the regional fire academy. LIT's regional fire academy, which included three instructional buildings, fire



truck and training equipment, was destroyed due to floodwaters following Hurricane Harvey. The donation will allow students to gain hands-on experience with pumping operations while using the fire truck. The fire truck is a 1989 model and was completely refurbished in 2010, including a rebuilt motor and upgraded stainless steel piping. ExxonMobil has donated more than \$390,000 to LIT and funded more than 170 scholarships to students since 2009.

LIT received \$61,500 from the GHS Foundation for the Smith-Hutson Scholarship Program which provides 2018 Spring scholarships for the benefit of students enrolled in radiology, business management development, computer networking, accounting, sonography, general education/developmental studies, welding, process operating, instrumentation, emergency medical services, occupational safety and health, and the regional fire academy.

LIT welding students welded the frame to the super-efficient vehicle, which was designed by LU engineering students. The Shell Eco-Marathon is an annual competition that LIT has participated in for 11 years. The competition provides a forum so students can apply difficult engineer concepts to a project and produce innovative ideas that fuel green energy.

The contest presents new and challenging opportunities for welding students, Welding Technology Program Director John McKeehan said. The pipe that's welded is much smaller and thinner than what students normally encounter in class. The result is a culmination of eight months of hard work between both schools.
